In the past it was recommended that you have a minimum of three (3) days of emergency supplies on hand. This year they have increased that number to seven and up to ten (10) days of emergency supplies and water on hand in the event of a hurricane. In the event you must evacuate try to bring 3 days of rations and water with you.

Always have these items on hand: A two-week supply of medicines & prescriptions; First Aid supplies; extra clothing, toiletries, and eyeglasses; a manual can opener; an ice chest and ice; pillows, blankets or sleeping bags; a portable radio, flashlights and a clock, with extra batteries for all; water storage containers, bleach without additives; paper towels, plates, bowls and plastic utensils; nonperishable foods such as powdered drinks, crackers, cereals, canned meats, fruits & veggies; peanut butter & jelly, dried fruit, instant coffee & tea, salt & pepper, sugar, powdered creamer; and if needed pet food.

Don't forget to get cash ahead of the storm and fill your gas tanks (vehicles & propane.) Have insurance policies, bank books, passports, deeds, veteran and marriage certificates, copies of wills, etc. and emergency contact numbers of friends and relatives all in one bag you can grab & go if needed in a hurry. **Have a paper map and a plan** if you must leave, and notify family and friends of your plans before leaving.

During a power outage never use a generator in your home or garage. Use them only out of doors and more than 20 feet from your doors and windows. Do not assume that if there has been a power outage, your tap water is safe to drink. The water supply may be contaminated for up to 72 hours. If you are unsure, boil your water or treat it with bleach before using it.

During the hurricane season, the LPV CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Group keeps track of any storms by regularly perusing the National Hurricane website for storms coming from the south and west & east. Doug Faders e-mail newsletter will be utilized to give residents warnings and updates of approaching storms and their intensities.

After a storm when conditions are safer, the Team will be out and about doing their golf cart damage assessment routine and reporting to the Polk County Emergency Operations Center in Winter Haven. They are trained in light search and rescues, Emergency First Aid, and have the tools and supplies & equipment available to perform these functions stored on site at LPV. Help shed the quarantine blues and maybe a pound or two at the groove dance class. You can dance while standing, sitting and just holding on for safety. All residents are welcome.




